Gardening Lectures & Workshops for the Shenandoah Valley Gardener

Belle Grove Plantation and the Northern Shenandoah Valley Master Gardeners have teamed up to host a series of monthly lectures and workshops from April to October 2016. Lectures will focus on home gardening and the environment, and the knowledgeable instructors are members of the Northern Shenandoah Valley Master Gardener Association (NSVMGA).

Each monthly session will include a lecture followed by a hands-on workshop where students will put to use new found ideas. Students will go home with creations that range from decorated bird houses to starter gardens and from samples of herbed butters and vinegars (recipe cards too) to “good bug” homes, miniature gardens, pressed flower art, and Autumn-themed wreaths or swags.

A \$25 fee for each class will cover materials and other workshop costs. Participants who register for all seven (six) classes receive a reduced fee of just \$125 per person! That’s two free sessions.

Directions:

Belle Grove Plantation is located one mile south of Middletown, Virginia, on U.S. Route 11. From I-81 take exit 302 (Route 627/ Reliance Road), go west on Route 627 to U.S. 11. Turn left to travel south on U.S. Route 11. After passing through Middletown, follow U.S. 11 one mile south to Belle Grove Road and turn right. Follow the road one mile to the gravel parking lot. Follow the gravel drive beside the red barn and park in the rear lot. Many classes will take place in the barn; check class descriptions for specific instructions.

Learn to create and incorporate an oasis into a corner of your landscape, either in your yard or on your patio. Design and create a meaningful spot in your garden. Attendees will learn the principles and pleasures of small space gardens, as well as what to consider in

Ways to Use Fresh & Dried Herbs to Spice up Cooking

Growing herbs is a passion for many homeowners. Learn to use fresh herbs to liven up your cooking and in rolls and bread. Students will sample herbed butter and vinegar, learn to make these condiments to use themselves or to give as gifts, and then take home instructional hand-outs.



Participants will learn to make herbed vinegar and how to properly store these flavorful concoctions.

“Chef” Haun will demonstrate how to make herbed butter, cream cheese, sour cream, mayonnaise, and oils, including basting oil, as well as vinegars using red and white wine vinegar.

Recipes for pesto using basil, parsley, cilantro, and sun-dried tomatoes will be included, and participants will receive recipe cards and samples to take home!

Bee snug as a bug in a rug ...or a garden frame. Bugs are an important part of the ecology of the garden. Learn about good bugs and how to encourage them to hang around your garden and how to discourage bad bugs.



Students will get a natural bug habitat with a variety of materials and can then go on to create a one of a kind garden wall or fence display. Something that looks like nature's mosaic is really a home for bugs that

are so necessary for flowers and vegetables and fruits.

Students will be given a choice of materials to make this easy and great looking entomological home!

Autumn Wonders

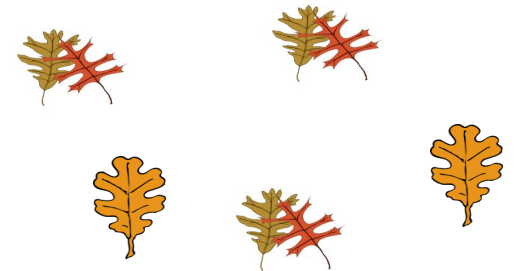
